## Firearm Safety and **Preventing Tragedy**

## Did you know...

- Of 6th-12th graders surveyed in Warren and Clinton Counties:
  - 252 youth report having carried a gun to school (1.6%)
  - 1,168 youth report thinking of killing themselves "often" or "a lot" (7.2%)
- In the last 10 years, 44% of the suicide deaths were as a result of firearms, making this the leading method used. Most were adult males.

## **Prevention is in Your Hands**

If a family member or friend is going through a rough time, make sure he or she can't get to guns. Secure weapons so they are not accessible by youth.

Violence, accidents and suicide can be prevented. To help, you can:

- 1. Store firearms and ammunition safely. Store in secured locations beyond the reach of children, teenagers and impaired adults. Use gunlocks, gun safes, or store ammunition and firearm separately.
- 2. Don't drink alcoholic beverages or use mind or behavior altering medicines/drugs before or during the handling of firearms. Substances can impair judgment and reduce inhibitions.
- 3. Consider additional safety precautions if a family member may **be suicidal.** When an emotional crisis (such as a breakup, job loss, legal trouble) or a major change in someone's behavior (depression, violence or heavy drinking) causes concern, storing guns outside the home for a while may save a life. Friends as well as some shooting clubs, police departments or gun shops may be able to store them until the situation improves.
